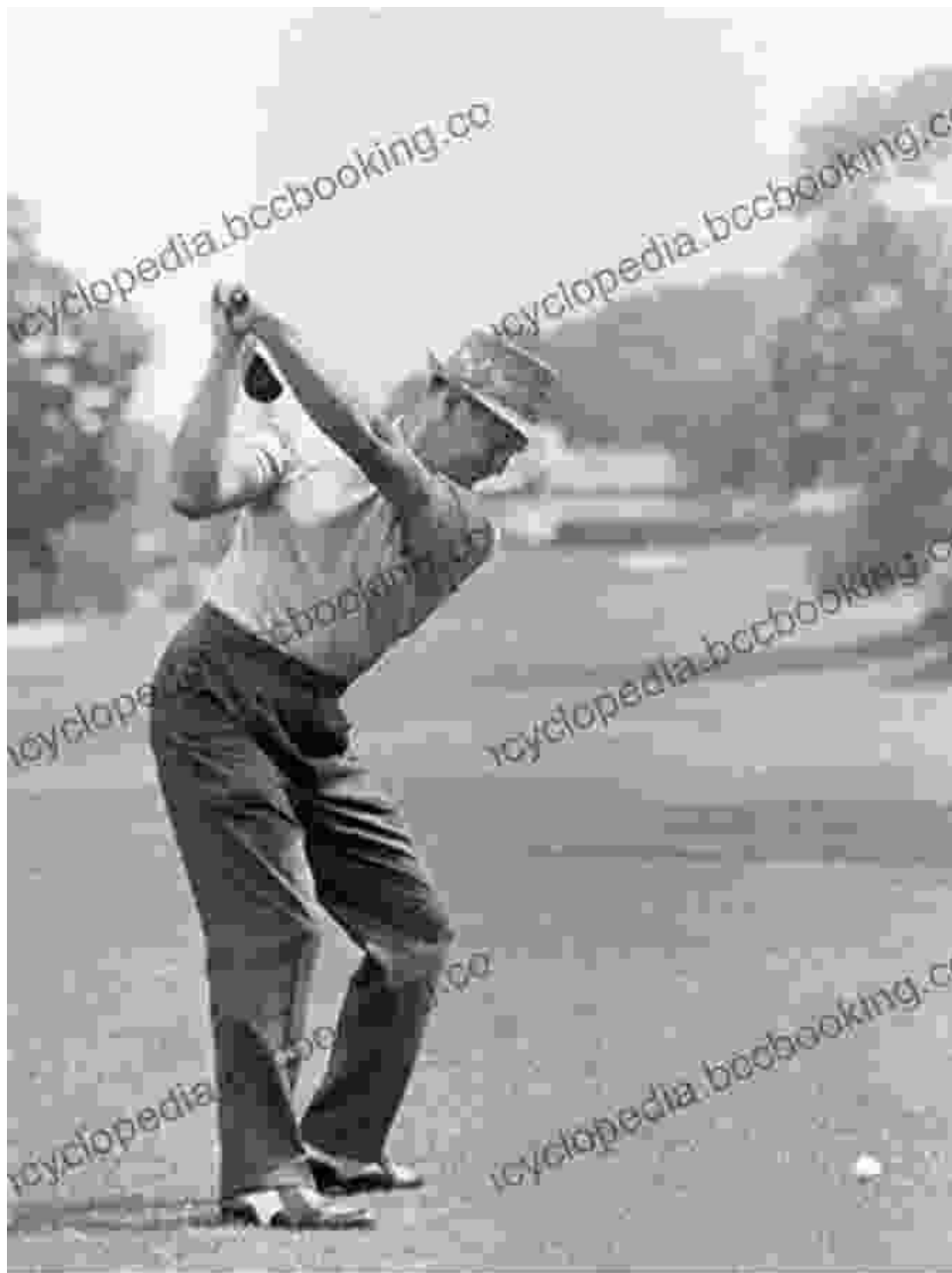


Sam Snead: The One and Only

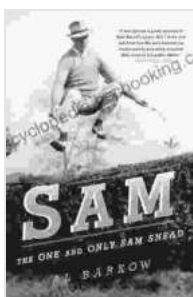

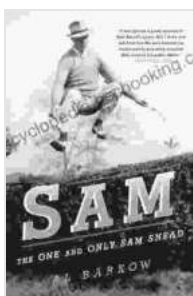

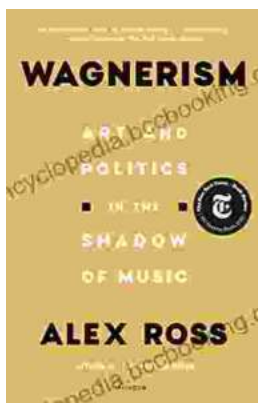
